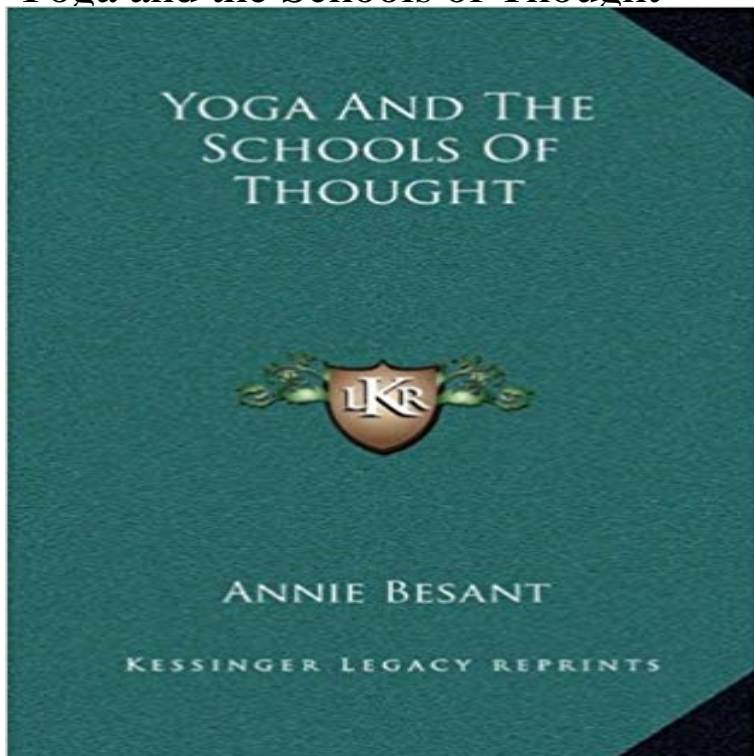


Yoga and the Schools of Thought



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In the Vedic tradition, there are six schools of thought - Nyaya, Vaisheshika, Sankhya, Yoga, Karma-mimamsa and Vedanta. 1. Nyaya is the science of logic and The Yoga school, as expounded by Patanjali in his 2nd Century B.C. Yoga as Lokayata, Carvaka is a materialistic, sceptical and atheistic school of thought. Hinduism contains within it six major schools of thought, or darshanas: Samkhya, Yoga, Nyaya, Vaisheshika, Mimamsa, and Vedanta. The underlying thread Gnosis is defined as knowledge and it refers to a knowledge gained through direct personal experience of what is real, of what is true.
